

STUDENTS STAY ON TASK


With the support of these resources, your students will stay on task and actually complete their book club discussion – even without you monitoring or supervising. Talk about a win—win!

ANCHOR CHARTS


These anchor charts are a great tool to use when introducing and setting up book clubs for the first time.

Includes full page and half page options.




BROCHURES







Book Club Meetings

Book club meetings can be a lot of fun if you follow these guidelines. Everyone must do their part if it is going to be a success.

Looks Like Sounds Like

- All members sitting in a circle or at a table.
- Everyone has their book out and is on the right chapter
- Everyone has their assignments completed.
- All members are sitting still and making eve contact with the person who is speaking.
- Everyone is participating in the discussion
- Members are taking turns
- Conversation stays on topic and related to the book
- Members use an appropriate volume for the book discussion.

Job Description:

Your job is to develop a set of questions the group can discuss during the book club meeting. You will also act as the facilitator and make sure everyone gets a chance to share.



Questions to ask yourself while reading:

- · What is the most important part of this selection?
- · How is the main character changing?
- · How is the storyline moving forward?
- · What do you think will happen next?

Job Description:

Your job is to think about how the story connects to your personal life and the lives of the members in your club. You are looking for possible lessons you can learn from the book.



Questions to ask yourself while reading:

- How am I or the members of my group similar to the characters in the book?
- What events in the story have I or the members of my group experienced?
- What lessons can we learn from this story?




