

B REASONS TO LOVE THESE MAIN IDEA LESSON SETS

Main Idea of Nonfiction Texts Topic Sentence Readers can identify the main idea by reading the topic sentence. The topic sentence is usually the first sentence of a paragraph. Whales often use noises to help them find food. They can use their tails and fins to make loud clapping noises on the EN surface of the water. This can scare schools of fish together which makes it easier for the whales to locate food


LOW PREP FOR TEACHERS


For each lesson you get a scripted lesson plan, anchor chart, teaching slide set, and half-page graphic organizer.


	INI LESSON: Main Idea & Details
Lesson texts.	Objective: Students will be able to identify the main idea of nonfiction
CONNECT 1-2 min	Have you ever watched an action movie? In the storyline, the character is often looking for one main thing to save the day. Whether it is a lost treasure or a secret tomb, the main character must discover certain details and clues throughout the story to find the one thing they are searching for. When we read a nonfiction text, we are like the hero in an action movie. We want to search for clues or details that will help us figure out what the text is mostly about. We want to find the main idea of the text.
TEACHING POINT 1 min	Today I want to show you how readers can identify a main idea in a nonfiction text. Note: If you would like to use a visual for this lesson, you can use the Main Idea Anchor Chart (next page) or the <u>Google Slides Presentation</u> to help facilitate your lesson.
	When you are identifying the main idea of a nonfiction text, think about the main thing the author wants you to learn from the text. The main idea is what the text is mostly about and is supported by details throughout the text.
TEACH/ MODEL 3-5 min	 When we are trying to find the main idea of the text, we can start asking questions to help us figure out the main idea: What is the topic of the text? What is the author trying to tell you or teach you about the topic? What text evidence did the author provide to help you identify the main idea? You can also pay attention to how the text is structured. Sometimes the author will use each section or paragraph to introduce a new main idea or detail to support the overall main idea of the text.
	The important thing for you to remember is that texts have main ideas. The main idea will tell you what the text is mostly about. We can identify the main idea by looking at the details included in a nonfiction text.
	Let's take a look at an example to learn more about how to identify a main idea of a nonfiction text. Note: You can refer to the example slide and/or show an example from a mentor text.
SUGGESTED MENTOR TEXT (optional) 3-5 min	Aliens From Earth: When Animals and Plants Invade Other Ecosystems by Mary Batten • This picture book is great for teaching main idea. It has a clear and identifiable main idea, and you can use it to demonstrate how you can find the main idea of a text in a variety of ways. Note: If you do not have a copy of this picture book, you can use any nonfiction text, article, or passage. No matter the text, your students can practice identifying the main idea. You can also look for a copy of this picture book being read aloud on YouTube.
ENGAGE 2-3 min	Turn & Talk: With a friend, answer or discuss the following: • What is a main idea? • Describe one detail that supports the main idea of the text we just read.
LINK 1 min	Remember, you can look for the main idea when you are reading nonfiction texts. The main idea is what the text is mostly about. You can find details in a text that support the main idea. Note: If you want to extend your mini-lesson, you can give students the stop-and-jot template (next page), and they can respond to the example you shared during the mini-lesson. You can also have your students use the template to respond to their independent reading.

Or, you can give them to students after the lesson and have them practice applying the objective to their independent reading.



Each lesson includes a teaching slide. This slide includes a lot of the same information on the anchor chart.


It is a great slide to display during the teach/model portion of your lesson. It will help you clearly communicate the objective to your students.

Each lesson includes an example slide. The example slide is a great slide you can use to either model or practice with your students.


It will either include a short paragraph or a chart or some other example related to the objective of the lesson.

Each lesson includes a turnand-talk slide with two questions you can use for whole group discussion at the end of your lesson.


The turn-and-talk slide also includes key reminders for how students should be engaging in discussion with their peers.




TAKE A CLOSER LOOK... GOOGLE SLIDE SET: CLOSING SLIDE

The final slides includes a reminder of what you taught and then blank space for you to customize the independent practice assignment for the day.


This is a great slide to leave up during your independent practice so students can be reminded of what you taught and also know what they should be working on.
